# Dividing the Land

Once the Israelites had entered Canaan, each tribe was given an area in which to settle, mostly west of the river Jordan. The tribe of Levi was given no land, but had certain towns to live in. Six 'cities of refuge' were also named. After the death of Joshua, 'Judges' such as Ehud, Gideon, and Samson led the Israelites against the Philistines and other enemies.

## The Prophets

During the period of the Divided Kingdom a number of prophets brought God's message to Israel and Judah, condemning social evils, faulty foreign policy, and kings who promoted the worship of pagan gods. This map shows the birthplaces and other sites linked with some of the important prophets.

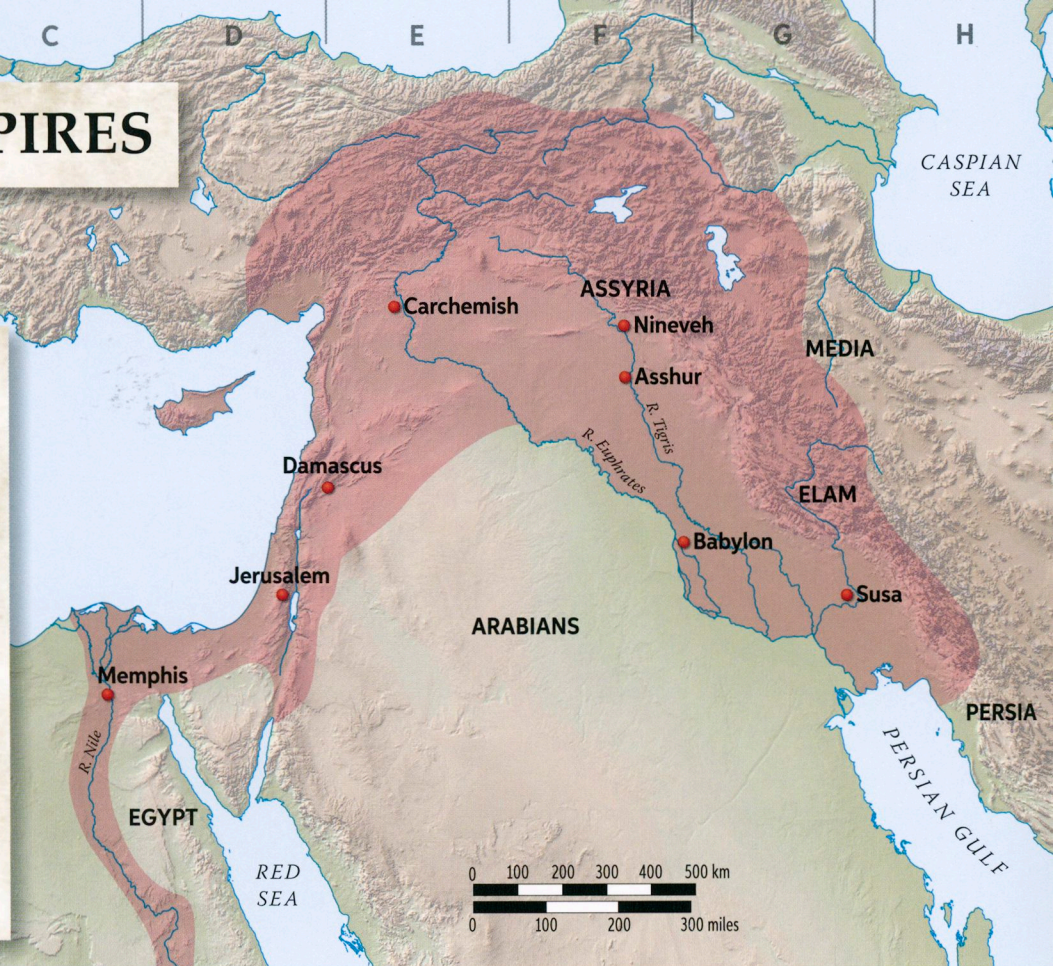
# FOUR EMPIRES

MAP 12

## Assyria

about 650BC

The Assyrian Empire reached its peak of power between 880BC and 612BC. In 722BC Assyria destroyed the Northern Kingdom, Israel, deporting its people; and subdued Judah, the Southern Kingdom.



MAP 13

## Babylon

about 550BC

The Babylonians took Nineveh, the Assyrian capital, in 612BC, and beat the Egyptians at Carchemish in 605BC. In 586BC Nebuchadnezzar destroyed Jerusalem and deported most of the people of Judah. So ended the Kingdom of Judah.
